


1. The meeting was called to order at 4:05 pm EST by Kristen Smith.

- 2. The Board went into Executive Session at 4:05 pm. The Executive Session ended at 5:23pm.
- 3. Kristen Smith proposed formation of an ad-hoc Harbor Park Special Committee comprising five Trustees to be separate from the current Building Committee. The purpose of the HPSC would be to represent the Library Board of Trustees in the process underway to place a warrant on the November ballot regarding river restoration and sea level rise in Camden harbor. At 12 members, the current Building Committee is too large to perform the required tasks nimbly. The current Building Committee would remain in place, less the five HPSC members, and continue to oversee activities pertaining to the ongoing maintenance of the Library, Amphitheater, and Harbor Park. After discussion, Kristen proposed a slate of Jeremy Pratt, Susan Todd, Jennifer Gromada, Larry Ward and Marisa Baskin. A motion was made and seconded to form such a committee with those members. The motion passed.

Executive Director's Report April 2024





Other News:

Our biggest news of the day revolves around the new Executive Director coming soon. Kristy Kilfoyle will be on site starting Monday, June 3. I will work with her for a day or two and then check back as needed for the next several weeks. Tentative plans are for me to work part-time through the month of May until Kristy arrives and then consult during the month of June. We'll talk more about this at the meeting.

Another important piece of news is that we have signed on with the Dolly Parton Imagination Library to be the "affiliate" for Knox County. If you are not familiar with the Imagination Library, it's a national program, but new to our State, and "dedicated to inspiring a love of reading by gifting books free of charge to children from birth to age five, through funding shared by Dolly Parton and local community partners". We will be taking responsibility for publicizing and organizing the program for families who sign up and live in our school district and/or county. It's a great opportunity for us to continue to reach out to families in our area and promote reading. This outreach will be funded locally by Jennifer Gromada and John Cummings as well as the Maine State Library.

In other, not-so-good news, we have sprung a leak or two in the Reading Room. We saw water dripping near the fireplace about 10 days ago during one of the many storms we've had recently. The second area of concern is located above the beginning of the biography section. Coastal Copper & Slate took a look last week and I am waiting for a quote. I hope to have more information and some photos to show next week.

Along the same lines, during our routine HVAC maintenance this morning, a refrigerant leak was discovered. At least it's not cooling season and we have time to repair before the heat of summer. I am told this fix will take about a day and cost approximately \$2,000. Even the "new" wing of the building is nearly 30 years old and we are finding that equipment is cycling out.

Treasurer's Report

February

- Please note a new Endowment: the Lynch-Leonard Family Fund. Total bequest to be \$75k for the History Center; \$10k on the books now. Money will be part of our portfolio at Allen Agency and we will pull profits
- A new expense line in the budget: the ED Transition Expense. \$1295 spent in Feb. Nikki guesstimates the total expense amount for the search will total around \$7k
- We have spent the Harbor Parks Appeal money

March

- A good month, esp. thanks to \$31k in development/fundraising from a few larger donors
- Electric costs have settled down
- An unexpected expense arose: the computer station that runs the HVAC controls needed to be upgraded
- Health insurance premiums increased in January and we are seeing the impact of that on the budget now

Future

- Nikki gave her end-of-fiscal-year budget forecast, and the overall takeaway is that there is still work to do in the final donations push; looking for about \$40k. As everyone knows, we had numerous unforeseen building and parks expenses in this fiscal year. We also added the executive search expense, which was not part of the FY2023-2024 budget.
- We will need to "find" the \$8k Relocation Allowance for the new ED in the FY2024-2025 budget
- And finally, we have some more upcoming building expenses that will tap into the reserves: there is a leak in the Reading Room and roof work will need to be done. Coastal Copper has already come to take a look and will have an estimate for us soon. Sprinkler maintenance will also need to be done, costing in the ballpark of \$4500.

Camden Public Library Statement on Harbor Park

April 2024

Camden's Harbor Park was a gift to the people of Camden from Mary Curtis Bok nearly a hundred years ago. Its landscape, designed by Olmsted Brothers, is a historic and scenic treasure that is a defining landmark of the town and harbor. The Camden Public Library Board of Trustees is the steward of Harbor Park.

In recent years, more frequent and intense instances of extreme weather, such as higher tides and stronger winds and storms, are causing repeated and increasing degradation to Harbor Park's shoreline in the form of erosion and structural damage. One-time fixes are no longer financially responsible or sufficient in scope to maintain the safety and appearance of Harbor Park. The Trustees believe that a more extensive project – which may comprise repair, restoration, and / or renovation – is now required to make Harbor Park a safe and appealing public space that will be resilient in the face of projected extreme weather events and rising sea levels.

The Trustees are aware that the Town of Camden is presently investigating an extensive environmental project to address sea level rise in and around Camden, along with river and habitat restoration, which will impact Harbor Park. If such a project is approved by the voters of Camden, to assist the Town and other agencies engaged in the design of a comprehensive solution, the Trustees wish to express their priorities for any project which encompasses Harbor Park. Rather than directing or prescribing a specific solution or components thereof, the Trustees have identified the following important Harbor Park features and usage requirements considered necessary in any proposed design.

- Of utmost importance is fealty to the design philosophy of Olmsted Brothers and the expressed interests of Mary Curtis Bok, who desired to provide a space of beauty and enjoyment for all people. Olmsted's design approach was characterized by a deep appreciation for nature, a commitment to social and environmental values, and a belief in the transformative power of well-designed landscapes to enrich lives, strengthen communities, and harmonize human and natural systems. As noted in Olmsted's correspondence, instantiations of these sentiments in Harbor Park included open grassy grounds like a "New England Common," simple curved pathways, unadorned space, rugged native trees and plants (not flowering), grading that provided unobstructed views into and through the park from various points, and screening plantings to block the view of built structures, to create a place of respite set apart from the town. These features remain as desirable today as 100 years ago.
- Functionally, any proposed design must eliminate or reduce damage to the shoreline and Harbor Park grounds experienced due to weather and water-related events.
 Grounds and structures should be resilient and maintainable to meet year 2100 storm

Camden Public Library Statement on Harbor Park Supporting Information

Olmsted Comments Regarding Harbor Park: In 1928, Olmsted Brothers were hired by Mary Louise Curtis Bok to create a plan for the neglected hillside parcel of land between Camden Harbor and Camden Library. Bok likely hired Olmsted Brothers as they were currently working on subdivision and bird sanctuary in Florida for her husband. With Frederick Law Olmsted Jr. taking the lead, he was tasked with reworking the two-acres of land.

To emphasize framed views, Olmsted Jr.'s design needed to employ a strategic grading plan. Curved walking paths take visitors from the street to the shore, with lush planting beds blocking views of nearby homes and stores. Olmsted Jr wanted native plants like American juniper, blueberry and lilac shrubs to flourish, many of which still do as Olmsted Jr.'s plan was carried out.

From the National Register of Historic Place Registration Form, National Park Service, August 7, 1999: In contrast, the harbor-side park of Camden is tiny, less than two acres. Rather than being visually separate from the rest of the village, its role has been as a shared visual green space, open to views from within and without. Historically its function has been two-fold: it has provided a series of attractive views of the harbor while at the same time providing a series of views toward and over it from other areas around the harbor, including sections of the library grounds that look directly into it. The number of such visual services for surrounding areas that the park has provided is truly remarkable for so small a space.

First, it provides an almost perfectly semicircular green foreground for the view from the Palladian window in the library, the key vista from that building. Second, it provides a foreground for views from the edge of the library grounds above Atlantic Avenue. Third the principal function of the lower section of the park is to frame a vista toward the harbor from the amphitheater. Fourth, the park is a place from which to view the harbor. The plantings at the Main Street end of the park have served to block views of the unsightly backs of stores along that street. Originally, other shrub groups were planted so as to block views of the backs of houses on Sea Street. Today the plantings on the steep hillside facing the cascade of the Megunticook River as it runs into the harbor also block out the view of the barren public landing and the reflections of the chrome and windshields of the vehicles parked there. Fifth, the park is a spacious green foreground for the view of Mount Battie and Mount Megunticook from the harbor, greatly enhancing that uniquely beautiful harbor view.

Montgomery Dam and the design of Harbor Park, from National Park Service documents, Bok and Olmsted correspondence, and Olmsted drawings in the Walsh History Center at Camden Public Library: When Mary Curtis Bok envisioned a park and hired Olmsted Brothers to design it in the late 1920s, the abutting parcel containing Montgomery Dam was owned by J. Hugh Montgomery. This parcel was never purchased by Bok for inclusion in the Harbor Park property nor was it considered part of the Harbor Park

Olmsted Design Principles

The Olmsted brothers' design approach was characterized by a deep appreciation for nature, a commitment to social and environmental values, and a belief in the transformative power of well-designed landscapes to enrich lives, strengthen communities, and harmonize human and natural systems.

Naturalistic Design: The Olmsted brothers were proponents of naturalistic landscape design, which sought to emulate the beauty and functionality of natural landscapes. They believed that landscapes should appear harmonious and integrated with their surroundings, using organic forms, meandering pathways, and native vegetation to create picturesque scenes that evoke a sense of tranquility and immersion in nature.

Integration of People and Nature: Central to the Olmsted brothers' philosophy was the idea of designing landscapes that accommodate and enhance human experiences while preserving and celebrating the natural environment. They believed that well-designed parks and green spaces could provide opportunities for recreation, relaxation, and social interaction, while also serving ecological functions and fostering a sense of stewardship towards the natural world.

Functional Design: Olmsted Brothers' landscapes were not only aesthetically pleasing but also highly functional. They carefully considered the practical needs and activities of park users, designing spaces that facilitated various recreational and cultural activities while ensuring accessibility, safety, and sustainability.

Social Reform and Democratic Ideals: Frederick Law Olmsted, in particular, was deeply committed to social reform and believed that well-designed public parks and urban green spaces could promote social equity, democracy, and public health. He viewed parks as essential democratic institutions that should be accessible to people of all social classes, providing opportunities for leisure, education, and civic engagement.

Regionalism and Contextual Design: Olmsted Brothers emphasized the importance of designing landscapes that respond to the unique environmental, cultural, and historical characteristics of their context. They advocated for a regional approach to landscape design, using local materials, vegetation, and topography to create landscapes that reflect the distinct identity and character of their place.

Environmental Conservation and Preservation: Olmsted Brothers were early advocates for environmental conservation and the preservation of natural landscapes. They recognized the ecological value of parks and green spaces in mitigating urban pollution, preserving biodiversity, and protecting natural resources, and incorporated principles of sustainability and environmental stewardship into their design practice.

Camden Harbor Park and Amphitheatre Report to the library trustees April 12, 2024

Finances

With a little more than two months remaining in the 23/24 fiscal year the Parks Maintenance Budget is already over spent by 25%, with another sizeable bill in the pipeline. As of now storm damage mitigation has cost about \$14,500, which accounts for the overage.

Maintenance

No maintenance has been done or needed in the first three months of the year. A lot of the work we usually schedule for the spring was done in the fall.

Storm Damage

The most recent storm left a lot of debris and crushed stone washed up on the lower pathway. The benches took a beating. Three were dislodged. One was on the beach, another got shoved back into the shrubs and a third was missing altogether and never recovered. Also, there was a lot of erosion behind the seawall, but the seawall itself remained intact except for one small stone.

Since then, Maine Stone and Landscape has reset the two benches we recovered. They cleaned up all the crushed stone and debris and they have backfilled the erosion behind the seawall with crushed stone.

Weddings

The count for weddings in 2024 is now at fourteen. Camden venues suitable for wedding receptions are in big demand. We have lost at least two prospects because they could not find a reception venue available on the day of their wedding. The first wedding occurs on May 11th.
